# Confirmation Begins this Weekend

#### **Registration Still Open**

Confirmation begins this Sunday, Aug. 21, from noon to 2 p.m. with a parent information meeting and a fun kickoff activity for students. Classes will then be offered beginning the following Sunday, August 28, at the 11 a.m. hour.

onfirmation is the opportunity for each student to make their faith their own. When children are baptized at a young age, they are entrusted to their faith community to be brought up in the faith until they can claim it for themselves. Confirmation is the opportunity for each student to do just that.

Confirmation classes will be different this year. The classes will be more indepth, giving students the opportunity for more extensive study of the Bible and the church. Over the course of 10 weeks, students will have the chance to discover for themselves what the Church is all about. Covering every topic from the Bible to baptism, students are offered the chance to learn about their faith in a new way, ask their tough questions, and develop friendships with their peers that can last a lifetime.

Anne-Marie Berg, WC Pastor for Young Adults, will join WC Kids Co-Director Denise Bennett in overseeing confirmation this year. The program will have a new curriculum, written by our pastors with the students specifically in mind.

"Each lesson will be geared toward the interest and engagement of the students, as we work to make sure they are building a faith meaningful to them," said Berg. "Confirmation will take place over the course of several months, ensuring that students will have time not only to develop well grounded understandings of key facets of their faith, but will also have time for fun and new friendships!"

That Fellowship Hall is gone, and Grandy's is no longer located in Grapevine, but the \$5 price tag for the dinner still remains.

Rev. Carolyn "Jo" V. Ponder, loving mother, grandmother, and friend, passed away at her home in Southlake, Texas on August 15 at the age of 80.

Jo was born on May 22, 1942 in Cairo, Illinois to Betty and Edwin Vowels (deceased). After growing up in Charleston, Missouri, she studied at Ole Miss, and received undergraduate degrees from both Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary and from Dallas Baptist University. She received her Master of Divinity from Texas Christian University's Brite Divinity School.

# Remembering a Mentor and Dear Friend

We are still in shock as we grieve the loss of our beloved Rev. Jo V. Ponder, who passed into her eternal reward Monday morning. After decades of life-changing, life-giving ministry, Pastor Jo was reunited with her husband and sons, who preceded her into the Savior's arms.

o came to White's Chapel in the summer of 1996, and the church and our ministry bears her imprint of excellence. She dreamed, motivated, and saw the best in all of us and challenged us to strive for it. She was a cherished mentor, leader, and friend.

I remember our Senior trip of 1999. While the students went to a water park for the day, Jo and I rented a car and toured the Alamo Heights United Methodist Church in San Antonio. Their Sanctuary and facility were so striking that we imagined what that would be like for our community. We called and got the names of their architects, and when we were choosing a design for our new Sanctuary, those architects were among the top three that we interviewed and were ultimately selected.

Jo was a driving force in the design, the fundraising, and the planning of ministry for our Sanctuary. The program of classes and activities that define our church also bears her imprint. She was one of the most creative people, who could always see out ahead of what others could see.

Jo was also a passionate mentor and encourager of pastors. I love what one colleague wrote of her: "As we remember Jo, let's all thank God for her pioneering leadership and pastoring as a woman. What seems like a normal role for women today is possible because of the courage, devotion and grit of women like Pastor Jo. I am so grateful to the Lord too that she was part of my life and part of the life of our church."

Her service of celebration and resurrection will be Friday afternoon, August 26, at 3 p.m. Every detail of the service was planned by Jo, and it will capture the values that she held dear!

Let us continue to pray for her family and for our church family as we deal with our loss.





Directly west of the fountain, at the front of the White's Chapel sanctuary, stands a memorial gift to God, the church and the community.

Ponder Memorial Prayer Chapel has been a refuge for many in this area since the opening of the sanctuary in 2002. It was originally built in memory of two family members of Pastor Emerita Rev. Jo V. Ponder: her late husband, Lee (who passed away in 1997, only a year after her appointment to White's Chapel), and their son Pete (who perished about two years earlier).

"My husband was an investment banker who traveled extensively around the country," said Ponder in an interview in 2011. "In doing so there were many organizations and representatives who were kind enough to send donations to help build this chapel. We took that amount and added to it from friends and family."

The idea for the chapel came while researching architectural models for the current sanctuary.

"I came to White's Chapel in 1996 and the next year the [pastoral] staff went to see the Crystal Cathedral (Garden Grove, California)," she said. "I saw their prayer chapel at that time and I kind of put it in the back of my mind. The next year, John took the pastoral staff to San Antonio to visit the Alamo Heights United Methodist Church, and again, while there, we saw their prayer chapel."

The architects of the White's Chapel sanctuary were also the architects for Alamo Heights UMC. "Many things of our church are inspired after the look of that church," she said. "The prayer chapel was certainly accessible, and I decided we had to do that."

The gift of the chapel was especially near to Ponder's heart because she felt it was the embodiment of so many of the qualities she loved about her church.

"It represents a great deal of what is true about White's Chapel," she said. Most importantly, the chapel is physically accessible to all, and it is open to anyone at all times of the day and night. "Anyone of any faith that would like to come.... we designed decks so that it is handicap accessible; heating, cooling, and lights would be on at all times."

It was especially important to Ponder that the prayer chapel not have a lock on the door. "No one can be locked out," she said. "That was really important as it is an expression of the extension of White's Chapel: If there is any need of anyone in the community and perhaps their pastor or a friend is not available, we designed it so that it would always be available as a refuge."





The dinner has sustained the enormous growth of the community and of the church. The location on the church grounds has changed numerous times, but the meal remains a meeting place for families and friends, young and old.

During the pandemic, Wednesday Night Dinners became a mainstay of communication: church and community members driving through the parking lot exchanged family reports, financial needs, prayer concerns, and community news for weekly meals. White's Chapel delivered meals to many with health risks. For months, the Wednesday mealtime was the only time we saw each other.

"Our dinners allowed people to get out of the house in a safe, healthy way, and provide an inexpensive meal during an uncertain period of time," said Dr. Judy Hunt. "We also used it as a way to stay connected to shut-ins and others who needed a message of encouragement."

With the pandemic waning and vaccinations available to all ages, Hunt is excited that this fall's Wednesday Night

Fellowship Dinners will return to their original purpose: fellowship.

"Now that communities are out of lock down and so many of our programs are reestablished, we have other ways of connecting and getting the information to minister to the congregation and community," she said.

"We want to return to games and programming that make the dinners fun and entertaining. We want it to return to a family atmosphere."

She added that the dinners "obviously feed into the Wednesday night programming, which is also familyoriented, offering classes and activities for all age groups." This is just another way for our community to meet other people with the same interests and commonalities within the church family.

While the meal will continue to be served in Evans Hall, one change will be that to-go meals will not be offered.

"It's like the loaves and fishes," laughed McKellar. "No matter how many we plan for, there is always very little left over."

Wednesday Night Fellowship Dinners start back on August 24, with a menu of beef or chicken fajitas and all the fixings. Child-friendly menu items are also available. Serving lines are open from 5 to 6 p.m. Fall programming will follow.

Berg has fond memories of her own confirmation experience.

"What stands out to me about my own confirmation class, more than 15 years ago, was that I knew, even as a sixth grader, that my confirmation teachers really cared about me," she said. "Even more than just how I was doing, and what I liked, these teachers really cared that I learned and valued the information I was given. With their careful attention to our lessons and the students each week, I walked away thinking that they were giving me something really important.

Berg remembers distinctly the service in which she was confirmed. "I was

this program at this time in their lives, students are offered a new level of learning just as they need it. They are able to not only fully inherit faith from their church community and family, but to make it last by making it their own. Finally, the opportunities to share life, love, and laughter with their class leads them into middle school and high school, not only with a firm foundation of faith, but a solid network of friends and mentors to turn to in the coming years."

Knowing when a child is ready to engage in confirmation is up to each parent. However, by the time a student enters sixth grade, they more often than not, possess the skills and experience needed to engage in their faith in this new way.

Nevertheless, if a student does not experience confirmation in sixth grade,

surrounded by my community of faith, and how I felt like, for the first time, I did not just go to this church, I was part of this church. That experience drew me back to church time and time again as a teenager, college student, and young adult, and my hope is that the students at White's Chapel will be able to experience that same level of care, and value; that same gift I was given at their age."

White's Chapel places a particular emphasis on confirmation for those in the sixth grade and older. When a student enters this phase of their life and education they are simultaneously letting go of purely abstract thinking, and moving into the ability to understand more in the abstract. It's in this crucial phase of development that students experience new levels of understanding, are able to formulate new kinds of questions, and need community more than ever.

"Confirmation comes at this stage as the perfect answer to each of those needs," said Berg. "By engaging in

Unlike any other Sunday School class, this program concludes with a ceremony on Sunday, Nov. 13, as confirmands may express a public profession of faith, and are invited to join the church as full members.



that the people are the church.

That was especially evident during COVID-19, when the congregation couldn't regularly meet on campus. The church still thrived despite only being able to offer online services, drive-thru dinners, and a chance to give muchneeded supplies to community members. Why is that? White's Chapel has never been just a building; it's always been a place to make genuine connections while striving to grow deeper in faith. Even though the property itself is more than 150 years old, the church has continued to meet people's needs through programming, support and fellowship. The church building is just a structure, while the church community is what really makes WC special. It's a place to learn about the Gospel and a place to share that joy with others.

People often need other people for support, and that's why many have come to this church. They've found a unique community of faith and encouragement when they've needed it most.

Carrol B. recently shared how she found comfort at White's Chapel after losing her mother. She wrote: "In March, 2007, I buried my mother on a Saturday and on the following Monday morning, I went to WC seeking help - no appointment; I just showed up. I was not a member. My husband and I had visited a few times and I guess something happened inside me that Monday morning that led me to a place of comfort. The first person I met was Pastor Betsy Godbold, and that meeting deepened my spiritual life many times over the years. Through remarkable worship experiences during each liturgical year; receiving care through

the Stephen Ministry; participating in delightful social events; learning more about and growing my faith through various classes; and getting to know some of the pastors well are just a few of the ways WC is deeply embedded in my heart and soul. God shined His compassionate love on me that morning He guided me to WC. I continue to meet His love in so many people at WC."

Carrol's story is one that may resonate with many others. Finding comfort in the midst of a difficult moment is such a blessing – and having a church where that happens regularly is inspiring. No appointment is needed to be led by God. It often happens in the moment; we just have to be open to it.

Sarah H., a staff person and longtime member of the church, shared her 'why': "There's something comfortable about White's Chapel... it's a big church that feels small. The community starts to become more and more like family, you know? I didn't have a huge family growing up, so my parents' Sunday School class threw all my bridal and baby showers ... they really became an extension of our family. I felt like I got so much out of the church when I was younger... so now, working with the church, I feel like I am giving back to the community that's given me so much. And now, my son is growing up in the church, too - just like I did."
