#### THE BEST SOFT & CHEWY SUGAR COOKIES

#### INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup (2 sticks) unsafted butter, melted and
- 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar + additional 1/2 cup sugar to roll
- 1/4 cup packed light brown sugar
- 2 large eggs
- 1 tablespoon vanilla extract
- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons cornstarch
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon baking sada
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder

#### INSTRUCTIONS

In a large bowl or the bowl of a stand mixer with the cookle whisk attachment, beat together the melted butter, 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar, and the light brown sugar. Add the eggs and vanilla and beat until just combined and smooth

Add in the flour cornstarch, sait, baking soda, and baking powder. Mix until well combined, but be sure not to over-mix. Cover the dough and refrigerate for at least an hour.

Preheat the oven to 350°F. Line a baking sheet with

Scoop a 2-3 heaping tablespoons of cookle dough at a

Place anto the prepared baking sheet, giving plenty of room for spreading. You should be able to fit 6-8 cookies per tray.

Bake for 12-16 minutes, or until the edges are JUST beginning to set and the centers are still puffy and soft and see underbaked. Remove from the oven and let cool FULLY on the baking sheet to set the cookles

## The Three Kings

By Henry Wadsworth Longfellow

Three Kings came riding from far away, Melchior and Gaspar and Baltasar; Three Wise Men out of the East were

And they travelled by night and they slept by day,

For their guide was a beautiful, wonderful star.

That all the other stars of the sky Became a white mist in the atmosphere, And by this they knew that the coming was near

The star was so beautiful, large and clear,

Of the Prince foretold in the prophecy.

Three caskets they bore on their saddle-

Three caskets of gold with golden keys; Their robes were of crimson silk with rows Of bells and pomegranates and furbelows, Their turbans like blossoming almond-trees.

And so the Three Kings rode into the West, Through the dusk of the night, over hill and dell,

And sometimes they nodded with beard on breast,

And sometimes talked, as they paused to rest, With the people they met at some wayside well.

"Of the child that is born," said Baltasar, "Good people, I pray you, tell us the news; For we in the East have seen his star, And have ridden fast, and have ridden far, To find and worship the King of the Jews." And the people answered, "You ask in vain; We know of no King but Herod the Great!" ## DECEMBER **GARDENING TIPS**



All bulbs, including daffodils and grape hyacinths at any time. Tulips and Dutch hyacinths require "pre-chilling" to give them an artificial winter. Without at least 45 days at 45 degrees, they will not flower normally. They should not be planted until the soil cools after mid-December. Plant cool-season annuals including pansies, violas, snapdragons, pinks, flowering cabbage and kale. In protected places, add in stocks, sweet alyssum, Iceland poppies and others. Established trees and shrubs that need to be relocated can be transplanted after they've been exposed to one hard freeze. (Many parts of the northern two-thirds of Texas are already there.) Hold soil balls intact around their roots to lessen shock of transplanting.

#### **PRUNE**

Remove browned stubble from perennial and annual flower gardens now that they have frozen, also from the vegetable garden. Use a long-handled tree pruner to remove mistletoe from trees. There is no effective consumer spray. Its white berries are its means of spreading, so eliminate the plants and their berries before birds carry them to other branches. Prune tree roots that threaten to extend beneath your foundation, driveway, patio or walk. Make the cut near the concrete surface and install a root barrier vinyl fabric to stop further growth. Shade trees can be pruned any time now, but remember never to "top" any tree for any purpose. That most especially includes crape myrtles. There is no satisfactory reason ever to top a crape myrtle, since it lessens their blooming and ruins their natural form. Fruit trees and grape vines can be pruned once they're completely dormant, but January is a better time.





Winter color annuals with diluted, water-soluble fertilizer (high-nitrogen analysis) each time they're watered. Houseplants with the same water-soluble fertilizer, but only once monthly while conditions are so dark during the winter. Compost pile with high-nitrogen lawn food to hasten decomposition of recently fallen leaves. Turn in 1 cupful per cubic yard of compost every six months.

100 singers and add such depth to our

"The Holy Spirit calls each singer to make the commitment to rehearse faithfully for 10 weeks and to memorize the music," Fuller added. "Ten weeks also gives us the opportunity to create an ensemble sound and develop friendships with other choir members. Our heart beats synch and our voices blend during the hour and a half rehearsal. Powerful moments of worship happen at each and every rehearsal!"

The choir rehearsed each Sunday evening from Oct. 2 until the week of the program. The orchestra had one long rehearsal in November, and both groups met three times the week of the CWE.

"In God's incredible economy, we can never outgive Him," said Fuller. "Blessings abound for those who share their time and gifts with our church. Their holidays are richer because of their faithfulness."

"Acts: Awakening to God in Everyday Life" Women's Study Wednesdays, Jan. 11 - Feb. 15 6 to 7 p.m.


