Cuba Medical Ministry

Designated for March Communion Offering

t is easy to assume that there aren't churches in Cuba. It is, after all, a communist country. But God is at work in the Methodist Church in Cuba.

In 1993, Cuba had 80 Methodist Churches with 800 members. The Church has grown by approximately 10 percent each year since that time. By 2022, 476 Methodist churches existed, with over 50,000 members.

Many medical doctors in Cuba have come to Christ and joined the Methodist Church. Cuba has an abundance of MDs but lacks the basic meds, like vitamins, painkillers, and generic drugs, to treat patients. The acute economic crisis that Cuba has experienced since the spread of COVID has multiplied the human suffering experienced since the communist revolution of 1959.

"These statistics suggest that more than 20,000 lives in Cuba were touched in the first year of the ministry," said Bee.

The Iglesia Metodista en Cuba organized a ministry to supply medicines to Christian doctors on the island in 2005. Headed by Dr. Aniran Ruiz Espinosa in Havana, the ministry distributes meds to doctors in Cuba that are connected to the church.

With that in mind, the White's Chapel communion offering for March will be designated for CUBA SANARA.

CUBA SANARA supports the Methodist Church of Cuba's Ministry to Relieve Human Suffering.

CUBA SANARA is a ministry of
St. Timothy on the Northshore out
of New Orleans, LA. The ministry is
solely dedicated to furnishing regular
supplies of over-the-counter drugs and
prescription meds to doctors in Cuba
through the network established by the
Iglesia Metodista en Cuba.

The ministry's goal is to order the meds requested by the Iglesia Metodista at discounted prices from Blessings International in Tulsa, Oklahoma. Packages are shipped monthly to a courier service in Florida which delivers the meds directly to the conference offices in Havana.

He taught orchestra and band classes to students from fourth grade through high school in the Moline, Illinois public schools, and was an adjunct professor of music at Black Hawk College, where he taught applied trumpet, jazz, classical guitar, and Renaissance performance. He was a conducting tutor at the University of Illinois and a trumpet clinician at the university's summer music programs.

As a performer, Connely has worked with entertainers including Bobby Vinton, the Osmonds, George Kirby, Della Reese, Art Linkletter, Mahalia Jackson, Peggy Lee, Florence Henderson, the Red Skelton Band, and the Les Elgart Band. He has performed at various festivals and venues including Tanglewood

Festival, and Ely Cathedral (Cambridgeshire, England.)
Additionally, Connely has been music director and conductor for various summer stock theater productions and has composed and arranged for the Miss Illinois Pageant, Tarrant County College, the Flutissimo! flute ensemble,

God's Vision

s the cosmic ballet aligns once again, sky gazers and nature enthusiasts are gearing up for the celestial spectacle of the year – the solar eclipse on April 8. On that day, the eclipse will be able to be seen on a narrow path across the Earth. This path of totality will reach communities from Texas to Maine, this year including the Dallas-Fort Worth area. This is a once-in-a-lifetime phenomenon. The last time our area experienced a total eclipse was 1878, when White's Chapel was 7 years old, and Rev. Lewis M. White was still preaching here.

After April 8, DFW will not experience a total eclipse for an estimated 300 years.

An annular eclipse, which is what occurred last fall, is not a total eclipse. This is due to the distance between Earth and the moon. In an annular eclipse, a

"ring of fire" is visible around the moon. During a total eclipse, the moon is closer to the earth, and it perfectly aligns with the sun creating total darkness. DFW will experience 4.5 minutes of totality – the longest amount of totality in the country.

There are people and groups in each of our different communities preparing to gather in various parking lots on April 8 to witness this awe-inspiring show. However, to fully experience the event, the crucial accessory is special eclipse glasses. These specially designed spectacles are not your typical sunglasses; they are crafted with advanced filters to protect the eyes from the intense solar radiation during the event. Wearing these glasses becomes a ritual, transforming the observer into an eclipse connoisseur, ready to witness the dance of celestial bodies without compromising eye safety.

As I was reflecting on this upcoming event, I was thinking: Wouldn't it be amazing if we had special glasses that could give us a new sense of vision?... a

vision tuned into God's miracles; a vision of possibility; a vision that could help us find our place in the world. I love what President Woodrow Wilson wrote, "You are not here merely to make a living. You are here in order to enable the world to live more amply, with greater vision, with a finer spirit of hope and achievement. You are here to enrich the world, and you impoverish yourself if you forget the

Vision is a popular term in leadership circles. MBA classes discuss it, corporations dissect it, but vision eludes clinical formulations. Vision is instinctive, something God places in our hearts. Duke Ellington, the late jazz musician

and composer, was once asked to provide a definition of rhythm. He said, "If you've got it, you don't need no special glasses that definition, and if you ain't got it, ain't no definition gonna help." Vision is like that. It is a mental image of God's future. It sees from

> afar what could be. It is rooted in our understanding of God, ourselves, and our circumstances.

One of the most popular tourist destinations on earth is Walt Disney World. Walt Disney had a vision of what could happen in a central Florida swamp land that could bless families. It took seven years to plan and quietly acquire property, then four and a half years to build. Along the way there were many scoffers and doubters of his vision. On Oct. 1, 1971, almost five years after Walt died, Disney World has its grand opening. As they were having the dedication ceremony, someone turned to Mrs. Disney and said, "Isn't it a shame that Walt didn't live to see this?" Mrs. Disney replied, "He did see it, that's why it's here."

I hope that we don't just experience a miracle for four and a half minutes on April 8. I hope we keep those special glasses of faith so that we can have that special vision to see what God is up to all around us!

Conference offices in Havana have a secure storeroom where donations are warehoused until distributed by Dr. Ruiz. The supply of meds through mission teams is sporadic and unpredictable. CUBA SANARA will provide a regular supply to meet the chronic shortages of meds that Cuba faces.

Dr. Ed Bee, a member of St. Timothy Methodist Church in New Orleans, works diligently to assist in this medical ministry. Dr. Bee is an economist and economic development consultant, with a doctorate in International Development. He speaks Spanish and English, although not a native Spanish speaker. Born in Ft. Worth, he lived for 5 years on the border in the Rio Grande Valley before moving to Louisiana. He currently operates a consulting practice where he advises communities on states of economic development strategies, and is helping the State of Louisiana update its International Commerce Master Plan. He also teaches economic development at the university level. He holds positions as adjunct professor

of economics and finance at Murray State in Kentucky and in economic development and business at the University of Southern Mississippi. He has nearly 40 years of experience in economic

development "[This part of] the CUBA SANARA ministry was started at the beginning of 2023," said Bee. "The Mission Team at St. Timothy's approved my request in February of last year. I proposed that we conduct a trial of two shipments before we started soliciting donations for the mission. The first was delivered in early April (2023), without any pilfering or shortages, which is due to God's grace! The second trial arrived in Havana the following month."

God richly blessed the ministry's efforts. CUBA SANARA sent an additional five shipments of medicines to Cuba in June, July, August, October, and December.

The shipments contained 302,000 units of medicine. More than 80 percent of the units were antibiotics, blood pressure, allergy and diabetes meds, vitamins, and painkillers.

Blessings International estimates that these meds provided 248,000 days of treatment for chronic issues plus 15,000 curative treatments from meds such as antibiotics. A curative treatment is a dose of medicine needed to cure a single case of a disease.

"These statistics suggest that more than 20,000 lives in Cuba were touched in the first year of the ministry," said Bee. "We are supplying meds for under 5 cents per dose."

The entire Mission Team at St. Timothy is involved. Cuba has been a focus ministry for the church since 2017. Two other members of the congregation went with Bee to Havana in October of 2022. All three of these volunteers have had a role in forming CUBA SANARA once they saw the acute need to support the Methodist Church of Cuba's medicine ministry.

In addition to St. Timothy, Lea Theriot in Baton Rouge, "a dear Christian Sister," places the orders for the ministry with Blessings International. Theriot is a pediatric dietician and works at one of the largest hospitals in LA. She has been a member of Cuba mission teams since the late 1990s.

Bee first went to Cuba as a member of the LA VIM Team in 2011. He felt called to return in 2017, 2018 and 2022. Missions in 2020 and 2021 were cancelled due to COVID.

"On each of these missions we took medicines with us, normally 1-2 bags, which we gave to Dr. Aniran Ruiz Espinosa, the MD that heads the church's medicine ministry," said Bee. "Mission teams from other states have done the same thing for the last decade. These supplies, plus a few mailed packages from England, were the only sources of medicines to support the church's medicine ministry."

"While in Havana, God put on my heart the need to find a steady supply of meds to help our brothers and sisters in Cuba. Dr. Ruiz met me at the Methodist Center one night at 9 p.m. to talk about the chronic need for medicines. In the current financial crisis, clinics don't even have aspirin or ibuprofen to give to those with fever or pain. Things we take for granted like children's vitamins can't even be purchased there. Ruiz's visit, after an hour trip on the bus after

a long day at the clinic, touched my heart and motivated me to see if we couldn't use the resources at St. Timothy to make the supply of meds predictable and more abundant." Bee knew that OTC and generic

meds could be bought at wholesale prices from Blessings International in Tulsa. "We believed we could rely on the courier service that had delivered our generator to

Cuba to deliver the meds," he explained. "We also knew that the Government of Cuba is allowing shipments of medicines to enter the country duty free if brought in as "accompanied luggage" (baggage carried by a courier qualifies). When I returned I checked with the US Department of State to make sure we were not violating the US trade embargo with Cuba. When they sent me email confirmation that our shipments would qualify for the status of "Humanitarian Exemptions" I knew we were ready to do some trial shipments to put the idea to a real world test." This ministry has a goal to do a monthly shipment of meds to Cuba. Currently shipments are sent only as the funds become available. Each shipment costs about \$1,500. There are no overhead expenses or salaries in CUBA SANARA. Every dollar donated goes into purchase and shipment of medicines.

"Many Methodists from the United States equate what is happening in Cuba to the Apostolic age," said Bee. "Folks are coming to Christ all over the island. After 60 years of the failed promise that a Communist utopia is just around the corner, Cubans are looking for answers and finding them in the fellowships of the Methodist Church as well as the other evangelistic churches in Cuba (Baptist and Pentecostal primarily). The 500 churches are supported by what I would estimate are several thousand house churches that meet during the week. God is moving in a dramatic way in Cuba. I would invite members of your church to join me in the future missions to see for themselves how the church can thrive in the midst of government persecution and poverty."

As always, 100 percent of the offerings collected for communion at White's Chapel go to the designated recipient. The congregation's generous support is greatly appreciated.

We may not recognize the name Margaret Rose Powers but more than likely we have read her famous poem, "Footprints." Years ago, she wrote an article that shared the story behind her famous poem.

In the summer of 1964, Margaret was 20 years old and was recovering from meningitis on the family farm in Tillsonburg, Ontario. With meningitis, she was confined to bed for most of the summer. It was a difficult time for her, she wrote, "I've never felt so empty and afraid." One August evening, she wrote in her diary, "Lord, have You left me too?"

An unusual chain of events took place. Her brother invited her out to dinner hoping to cheer her up. On their way, they ran into one of his friends who asked to join them. Later, the man who joined them for dinner, Paul, would ask Margaret out on a date. Months passed and, in early autumn, Paul asked Margaret to marry him. They went for a walk along the shore of Lake Erie. "The waves hissed into bubbles at our feet," she recalled. "Paul stopped suddenly and pointed back at our tracks in the sand. 'See our footprints, Margie? On the day we marry, they will become like one set, not two."

That night, the image of footprints stayed with Margaret. She could not sleep, so she began writing in her diary.

"Dear Lord, I finally prayed, where are You now, when I need you so badly?"
Then, as if in a dream, she wrote, "I saw a story unfolding in my mind's eye. My pen took over as I began writing it out. I saw myself walking along a beach with the Lord, and scenes from my life flashed before us. But during the most painful scenes, I noticed only one set of footprints was left in the sand. I asked the Lord where He had been when I needed Him most. Then I wrote down His reply:

'My precious child,

I love you and will never leave you. When you saw only one set of footprints,

It was then that I carried you."

Her words have inspired millions. They say to us that we need to see life from God's perspective. Anytime we think we have God figured out, we are probably wrong. Anytime we think we are in control, we are definitely wrong. Instead, we live by the wisdom of 2 Corinthians 4:16-18: "So we do not lose heart. Even though our outer nature is wasting away, our inner nature is being renewed day by day. For this slight momentary affliction is preparing us for an eternal weight of glory beyond all measure, because we look not at what can be seen but at what cannot be seen; for what can be seen is temporary, but what cannot be seen is eternal."
