Communion Offering Benefits Tarrant Food Bank



Tarrant Area Food Bank will be the recipient of the October communion offering this weekend.

his nonprofit agency was founded in 1982 by a group of Fort Worth residents concerned about hunger in their community. TAFB is now the primary source for hunger-relief charities and feeding programs for, not only Tarrant County, but an additional 12 surrounding counties, serving 1,000,000 meals every week.

Nearly 500,000 people living across the 13 counties that make up the Tarrant Area face hunger. Stagnant wages and skyrocketing prices for food, shelter, gas, and utilities continue to make it harder for families who are facing hunger to access enough to eat. Rising costs have also impacted food banks' ability to provide and distribute food to meet the high rates of need.

Food banks like TAFB are now facing a reduction in donated foods due to reduced covid-related government

emergency food assistance to food banks and a 24 percent reduction in commercial food donations because of supply chain shortages.

The organization serves all people seeking food assistance, including low-wage workers and their families, senior citizens living on fixed incomes, victims of family violence and of disasters, the chronically ill, the severely disabled, the homeless, the under-employed and the

Something Good Is About to Happen Gaither Tour Comes to White's Chapel

hite's Chapel is honored to host the Gaither Vocal Band on Thursday, Oct. 13. Some say, "The Gaithers are to Christian music what the Beatles are to pop music."

While that is a huge statement, it was how Bill and Gloria Gaither were introduced when the American Society of Composers, Artists and Publishers (ASCAP) named them "Songwriters of the Century." Their songs have become standard fare for churches across all spectrums of American Christianity, including "Because He Lives," "The King is Coming," "Upon This Rock," and "Something Beautiful."

Since the early 1990s, the Gaither Vocal Band has served as a standard-bearer in the world of gospel music. Founded by the legendary songwriter and producer, Bill Gaither, this Grammy-winning vocal group has performed in the world's most prestigious venues, including the Sydney Opera House and Carnegie Hall.

The list of men who have comprised the Gaither Vocal Band over the past 30 years reads like a Who's Who among the gospel music industry's best-loved voices, including Steve Green, Larnelle Harris, Mark Lowry, Michael English, David Phelps, and many others.

A featured favorite in the Billboard chart-busting Gaither Homecoming Series, the Gaither Vocal Band continues to fill venues across America with a steady tour schedule every year.

Today, the Gaither Vocal Band roster is comprised of five power-packed voices, including Bill Gaither, Wes Hampton, Adam Crobb, Reggie Smith, and White's Chapel's own, Todd Suttles. Individually, these men are gifted artists and men of authentic faith. Together they are known around the world for their stunning vocals, innovative harmonies and lifealtering message.... a message of grace, hope, and redemption.

The White's Chapel concert will begin at 7 p.m. Doors open at 6 p.m.

Numbers are up all the way around and that's great, but the connections made within the group are deep and priceless. God continues to shine on this group and we're gearing up for lots of fun in the fall as well."
- We hope that you've noticed the incredible makeovers that are being done in our **Adult Education classrooms**. We've completed our work to repaint and deep clean each space; and we're now working to update the "look" of the rooms.
- The **Southlake Focus Group** partnered with the Texas Workforce

Commission to hold a job fair on campus last Thursday. It was a huge success with over 100 job applications completed! Both groups are so thankful to WC for opening our campus. In fact, here's a letter we just received from SFG: "We at Southlake Focus Group are always grateful for all that White's Chapel does for us, but I want to extend a great big thank you for all the help and accommodations that was provided to SFG for the SFG/TWC Career Event last Thursday. We had over one hundred job seekers, recruiters, and Texas Workforce Commission personnel get together in an effort to help the unemployed and to help companies fill their open positions. Everyone I talked to was very pleased with the event and very grateful for the facilities. A special thank you goes to the WCUMC staff that provided portable power and portable A/C when the TWC van developed generator problems. We cook and serve 4 meals a day and it is a never ending struggle to keep [upbeat] on deployment. My division and I are so grateful to receive your care package. Thank you."
- "My platoon and I truly appreciate your care packages! Your support to the military makes a positive impact, especially when we have tough days. Seeing my leaders and soldiers smile and laugh together while receiving your packages is what makes us continue pushing through the obstacles. I have attached a platoon photo (at least most of us). It is hard to get the whole platoon together because we are consistently running missions. Hygiene products are crucial with maintaining our health and welfare and those items you sent help us maintain that. The socks are always welcome, especially with the winter months coming soon! Also, the board games help build and maintain morale within the platoon,

which results in missions running more smoothly. This means the world to the first-time deployers and especially the ones who haven't received packages yet. Again, we greatly appreciate all you do to support the troops and bring joy into their lives."

- In preparation for the winter months, the Heavenly Stitchers have been hard at work making over 60 scarves for the homeless. They are all absolutely beautiful and made with much love! Thank you, ladies!
- Along those same lines, our **Looms** of Love ministry has started back for their fall session, and this ministry has grown tremendously. They currently have over 1,000 hats being prepared to donate, and they are making more to fill requests from four different ministries who need hats for their clients. Since this is a self-sustaining ministry, the group requested yarn donations to help offset their costs of supplies. The donation box has been overflowing each day it has been out. What a wonderful gift to have a congregation that puts their faith into action for those in need—to date, nearly 3,000 hats have been completed and donated!
- WC is pleased to welcome ASL **interpreter** Revetta Vannoy to Sunday worship at 9:30 a.m. and 11 a.m. Her presence with us helps us bring the Gospel to folks who can't hear the sung, spoken, or preached words! 
 On two Saturdays this month, WC partnered with **Habitat** for Humanity in building a home for the Padilla family.

temporarily and long-term unemployed. More than one third of those served by Tarrant Area Food Bank and its network are children

"Over 170,000 kids in our communities survive day to day without knowing where or when they will receive their next meal," says Julie Butner, President and CEO of the agency.
"We can't raise the next generation of kids to be thinkers and doers unless

we help them thrive with good nutrition when they're young."

The Food Bank supports numerous programs to help and educate the community as well as the food insecure. One such program, the Learning Garden, teaches community members about effective gardening techniques while they help tend the garden and grow nutritious fruits and vegetables that are distributed to those in need. Each week, volunteers are invited to come to the TAFB Learning Garden to help plant and harvest fruits and vegetables, pull weeds and learn new gardening skills.

Volunteers also help out in TAFB's Kindred Spirits Kitchen Garden located on the grounds of the organization's Dorothy and Norman M. Kronick building at 2525 Cullen St. in Fort Worth. In addition, TAFB provides garden tours and regular workshops on gardening techniques at the TAFB Learning Garden. The garden is located next to Ridglea Christian Church and The Glass House at 3251 Sappington Place in Fort Worth.

Finally, Cooking Matters®, a campaign of Share Our Strength, inspires families with limited food budgets to make healthy, affordable and delicious meals.

This innovative program provides a long-term solution to hunger by teaching practical shopping and cooking skills that make the most of existing resources, even when time and money are tight. Taught by volunteer nutrition and culinary experts, class participants learn

about basic nutrition and food budgeting, strategic shopping, and straightforward meal preparation.

The organization values and embraces diversity, fairness, and inclusion as fundamental to the vision of empowering communities where no one has to go hungry. The belief that access to healthy food is a basic human right and not a privilege supports the idea that all people deserve regular, nutritious meals.

WC's Suttles Rounds Out Gaither Band

Todd Suttles was added to the lineup of the Gaither Vocal Band as a new baritone singer in February, 2014. He came to the group from Vanderbilt University, where he served for 20 years as a Sports Fitness Director. He also served as Vanderbilt's CampVandy Youth Programs Director. He holds both a Bachelors degree and a Masters of Science in Health, Wellness and Recreation from Middle Tennessee State University.

"After 21 years in Sports, God had a new direction for me," said Suttles. "I went from developing bodies to prepare for NFL, NBA, WNBA, Olympics, and anything else you could think of that needed to be bigger stronger and faster to developing souls by spreading the good news of the Gospel."

Suttles, who now lives in the DFW area, grew up in Lafayette, Georgia—little town in North Georgia, just south of the Tennessee boarder. He was the fourth child of seven children.

"As a child, my parents had us in church every Wednesday and Sunday and sometimes again on Sunday night," he explained, "and every day of the week, if there was a revival! Farming was our life and singing was our ministry as children. My father taught us that only what you do for Christ will last."

He was certain that fitness would be his 'thing'. "I was a former World Powerlifting Champion and World Record holder and an eight-time national champion," he laughed, "but God has a great sense of humor and I'm the type of guy who had to learn it the hard way."

"I really didn't have a plan for music," he said. "Music has always been a part of worship for me. My parents made sure we knew that God was the center of our music and the voice and musical talents were given to us for God's glory—not ours. I worked at a great university with a flourishing youth program, reaching higher and higher, but the good Lord had a different plan."

While working in fitness, Suttles sang on the praise and worship team at his church while also doing background vocals and studio recordings for musicians in Nashville. One day while in a session with songwriter Buddy Green, (Mary Did You Know) Green told Suttles the Gaither Vocal Band had an opening for a singer.

"Not having formal training or a professional music background it would only be a God thing if I became a Vocal Band member, but Buddy suggested I try out for the position," Suttles said. "To me, this would be like going from a Little League baseball player to the Major Leagues. But God happened and nine years later, here I stand. Only by the grace of God."

As for finding White's Chapel, Suttles was working out in a local gym when White's Chapel choir member Jim Walters approached him. "He said I looked like the guy who sings for the Gaither Vocal Band," said Suttles. "I told him I was the guy and we continued to talk about gospel music. During the conversation, he told me he attended White's Chapel and invited me to come visit. The next day, he set up a meeting with the music staff. My family and I were met with such a warm welcome and an introduction to the church."

He and his wife Michelle have a little girl, Arrae, and have recently become members at White's Chapel. We are very fortunate to have them. His deep, resonant voice is matched only by his quick sense of humor, infectious joy and authenticity.

"I'm honored to be able to spread the good news of the gospel," he added. "I am human and not a perfect person, but I believe in a perfect God who will provide, protect and lead if we open up our heart and mind. When God looks at me I want others to see His reflection in how I live."


