To help those in need this Christmas, White's Chapel will be sponsoring multiple families and individuals during the long-standing and beloved Angel Tree Forest donation event. Through Dec. 4, participants will be able to donate items to help multiple groups in need including: families/

individuals in crisis (represented by the Presbyterian Night Shelter—PNS), babies and new parents (represented by JPS Foundation, Mercy House, and Pregnancy Help 4 U), seniors (represented by nearby nursing homes), military families and veterans (represented by PNS Patriot House and the WC Soldier Ministry), children in need of bicycles (represented by Spokes4Hope), residents at local shelters (represented by PNS and ACH Child and

Family Services), and families experiencing childhood cancer (represented by Lighthouse).

"The Angel Tree Forest helps White's Chapel reach out to those in need," one of the lead volunteers, Martha Reukema, shared. "Not only do we provide seriously-needed items to the recipients, we also want to share our love, hope and joy with them. They may not receive Christmas gifts, joy and love from anyone else."

The Senior Stockings and Baby Blessings are two of the most-recognized trees represented in the Angel Tree Forest. This year, the church will continue to care for those in the most venerable age groups. Each group will have one tree.

Confirmation Service This Weekend

This Sunday, during the 11 a.m. worship service, Drs. John McKellar and Todd Renner will present vows of membership to the fall Confirmation class. After the service, students will gather near the Jesus Fountain, where they will officially be Confirmed and receive a blessing from White's Chapel pastors. Baptisms will follow.



"Confirmation is a program that we have for young people, in grades six through 12, and it is a way for them to take a few weeks as a group to really invest in their faith," shared Confirmation leader and pastor Anne-Marie Berg. "So, they walk through critical matters of what it means to be a Christian, the understanding of God, the Bible, and what it means to be the church... and our hope is, by the end of this program, they will have the tools they need to claim their faith for themselves. In the Methodist church, we practice infant baptism. We do that as a way of

Dr. Aaron Alfred Lee

An Afternoon of Musical Blessings Presented Nov. 12 in Grace Chapel

White's Chapel is honored to welcome internationally known musician, composer and vocalist Dr. Aaron Alfred Lee on Saturday, Nov. 12 at 3 p.m. in Grace Chapel. There is no charge for admission; is no charge for admission; are encouraged and cheerfully accepted.

Lee, a native of Malaysia, is currently residing in the

United States of America. He received his degree in music composition from the College of Music at the University of North Texas, Denton, TX, and was awarded an honorary Doctor of Music degree from the Central Philippine University, Iloilo, Philippines. He began studies of music at the early age of 8, and his musical talent became public three years later, after winning a national keyboard/organ competition in Malaysia.

Lee has traveled extensively around the world. He has performed recitals and conducted seminars in Europe, Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Australia, the Bahama Islands, Canada, and the United States. He has appeared in many different high profile venues; among them are the Little Carver Theatre, The Mabee

Using our Liberties

"Honor to the soldier and sailor everywhere, who bravely bears his country's cause. Honor, also, to the citizen who cares for his brother in the field and serves, as he best can, the same cause."—Abraham Lincoln

From my earliest days, I was taught to honor the patriotic holidays of our nation (their dates were made all the more memorable since my mother's birthday is on Memorial Day, and my father's is on Veteran's Day). My father, who served in the U.S. Air Force before going to work for the Department of Veterans Affairs, always insisted upon having a flag on our front porch; and he made sure that we respected all the rules concerning its display. He instilled in my brother and me a sense of profound and lasting gratitude for all those who'd served... and for those who serve even now.

Patriotism, as he would teach us, was not just a matter of bunting and booming fireworks; it wasn't just a collection of stripes and stars flapping in the breeze. Patriotism was a sobering reminder of the price that had been paid for the liberties that we enjoyed... and it was a call. A call to sacrifice. A call to courage. A call to serve a cause that was bigger and higher and nobler than ourselves. It was a call to use our freedom, not simply

to do what we pleased, but to do what was right.

It took years for me to realize that my father was actually quoting the Apostle Paul: "For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become servants to one another" (Galatians 5:13). In a self-indulgent age, in this modern time of unparalleled connectivity and, yet, crippling loneliness, we come once again to an ancient question: How will we use the liberties that have been given to us? Or, better yet, how will we use the liberties that have been purchased for us: freedoms purchased on beachheads and in jungles, freedoms secured in deserts and in skies and on oceans' waves? Most of all, how will we use the freedom bought for us on an old rugged cross and in an empty tomb?

In this week when we celebrate our veterans, let us do more than simply thank them for their service (though, let's be sure to do that, too); let's show them that their service—their time and struggle and scars and sacrifice—is not taken for granted, that the freedom they chose to risk death to ensure is being faithfully and wisely stewarded in the ways we choose to live.

Senior Stockings are given to Medicaid patients in nearby nursing homes. The stockings are typically filled with generic items. With each donated item, recipients are able to experience the joy of receiving a gift at Christmas as many do not have family members to come to see them. Baby Blessings are given to parents of newborn babies associated with the JPS Foundation, Mercy House in Colleyville, or Pregnancy Help 4 U in Keller. The items provided through the Angel Tree Forest are given to these families to help them care for their new little one.

Lighthouse

Lighthouse is returning to the Angel Tree Forest donation event. The organization helps families living through childhood cancer. Families who have a child in the hospital have faced challenges in recent years. Participants will help provide care packages and meal/pharmacy gift cards for those represented in this group.

Military

Military families and individuals are often in need of support. This year, the Angel Tree Forest will continue to support veterans transitioning from homelessness as well as deployed/active military personnel. Veterans moving out of the Patriot House and into their own apartment will receive some household essentials through the Angel Tree Forest donations. Active military families may receive some small, requested items.

Many of these individuals represented are provided by the WC Soldier Ministry, which sends military boxes to troops throughout the year to provide support and offer a bit of joy.

Angels Represented In Person & Online

This unique donation experience has been a tradition at White's Chapel for about 17 years. Families and individuals are encouraged to participate in this year's event by adopting an 'angel,' either in person or online. A typical angel tag will list one clothing item, one 'want' and one 'need' to purchase with costs ranging from \$25–30 per 'angel.' Each individual may have specific items that are unique to their group. The number of items on each angel tag may vary. If someone is unable to purchase a physical gift but still wants to participate, gift cards are also accepted.

Participants can donate to the event, volunteer to sort gifts or deliver donated items to people in need this holiday season. Praying for each person/family represented is an important aspect of this ministry as well.

It has been said that these thoughtful gifts convey 'whispers of love' to each recipient. Please consider sponsoring a family or individual this season, and pick up an angel tag while you're on campus. Trees are available in the concourse and near Wesley Cafe. The virtual Angel Tree Forest is also available online.

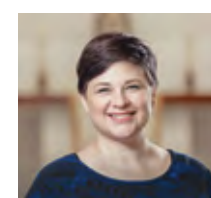

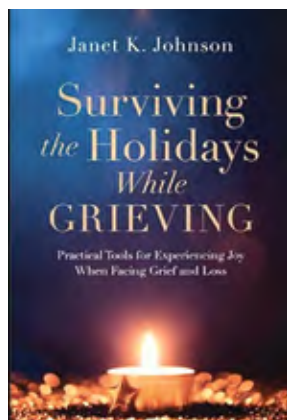
“Surviving the Holidays while Grieving”

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demonstrating that God loves us even before we know who God is. Because of that, parents give these vows on behalf of their children—so Confirmation is the continuation of that tradition. These children, who are often baptized as infants, whose parents have offered their faith on behalf of them, now get a chance to claim that for themselves.”

Berg and Denise Bennett, Co-Director of WC Kids, put together a 10-week Confirmation program for students to learn about faith, scripture, the Methodist tradition, and what it means to be a member of White’s Chapel. Since August, participants have attended one class a week, offered for students each Sunday morning or Wednesday evening. Wednesday nights also provided a time for middle schoolers to meet in a small group. While high schoolers had the option to attend the weekly classes, they were also able to work through the curriculum with their Cell Groups.

Participating sixth graders were able to build on their friendships at the first-ever overnight Confirmation Retreat at the end of September. The group experienced a worship service intentionally made for them, a short message from Berg, and a fun night at Group Dynamix in Carrollton. About 70 students were in attendance, and everyone enjoyed the trampolines, archery tag, dodgeball, and midnight pizza.

“We’ve gotten to see not just the kids engaging their faith but also building those really cool relationships with people within their church—which we hope that, as kids grow up in our church and stay within our walls, they become the next generation of Christian leaders,” Berg shared. “Building those relationships is the kind of thing that makes them excited about staying Christian in their teenage years, in their 20s, and beyond that. Our first goal is really that these kids come to know Jesus—that they have the tools to be Christian without someone having to hold their hand through that necessarily—but our secondary goal is that these kids feel like this church is their church, and that doesn’t happen without these key relationships. That is why we have taken so much extra time

this year to invest in Confirmation, and we’re seeing that success as kids build relationships with their small group leaders and their peers. It’s one of my favorite parts!”

Each session typically began with a large group teaching before breaking off into smaller groups for the last portion of class time. This is where kids could connect with their peers, ask questions, and work through the information presented to the group.

Berg is honored to have had so many small group leaders to invest in this semester’s Confirmation class. Twenty-two adults gave their time and energy for 10 weeks to help these sixth-grade students understand their faith in a deeper way.

“It’s a joyful task but it’s not always an easy one,” Berg shared. “We’ve never had such committed volunteers or, honestly, such beautiful results. We’ve had emails from two different leaders already who have asked to stay in their small groups next semester even though Confirmation will be over—isn’t that awesome? It’s so great!”

Students will conclude their Confirmation experience with the upcoming service on Sunday, Nov. 13, at 11 a.m. They will process in, with the pastors and sit at the front of the sanctuary. The Confirmands will then be asked by the co-pastors to rise and take the vows of Confirmation. They will confirm that they know who Christ is, who God the Father is, and who the Holy Spirit is. At the end of the service, the Confirmands—along with any family members—will gather at the front of the sanctuary to become members. At that time, they will take their vows membership.

After the service, the group will process out to the Jesus Fountain, where there will be six different stations for students to be officially Confirmed by a pastor. Then, those who have not been baptized will have the opportunity to do so—by either sprinkling or immersion.

“I’m just so excited to see how they continue to engage in White’s Chapel as students and as our future leaders,” Berg said with a smile. “I think that that only happens because they’ve engaged so much in what we’ve offered them. Anyone can sit in a room and hear about God, the Bible, and faith for 10 weeks, but I think nothing transformative happens unless you lean into it and that’s what I’ve seen these students do.”

Center, Charles W. Eismann Center, The Meyerson Center, the historical St. Andrew’s Cathedral in Sydney, Australia during the 2000 Summer Olympic Games, and the Dora Stratou Theatre by the Acropolis at Athens, Greece during the 2004 Summer Olympic Games. He also performed for the enthronement of the Anglican Archbishop of the Bahamas, and was interviewed by Premier, the largest Christian radio broadcasting station in London during the 2012 Summer Olympic Games. In 2002, he arranged and composed the opening number for the Mary Kay Cosmetics Annual Convention, and performed at the Dallas premiere of the movie Star Wars- Episode 2: “Attack of the Clones.”

Active as a classical composer, Dr. Lee has works performed & commissioned by major symphony orchestras and music ensembles. Among them are the Greater Fort Worth Community Band, the Cottbus Youth Symphonic Band of Germany, the Macau Chamber Orchestra, the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra, the Malaysian Philharmonic Orchestra, the Berlin Symphony Orchestra, the Shanghai Philharmonic Orchestra, and the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra of London. The American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP) has

recognized him with special distinction as being the top five in the 23rd Annual Rudolf Nissim Award among 300 peers of classical composers. In 2005, he was commissioned by the Long Duo (pianists) to compose a work for two pianos for Carnegie Hall, New York.

However, among all the accolades attributed to him, Lee considers his conversion to Christianity the utmost best of them all, and gives glory solely to God alone. He invited Christ Jesus into his heart at the age of 17, and since then, by God’s divine guidance, he continues to bring many souls to Salvation, winning them for Christ through his powerful and anointed music. In 2001, his family of Buddhist and Taoist origins converted to Christianity. In late 2014, under the divine guidance of the Holy Spirit, he began setting up an international ministry focusing on evangelism through music. Now established and named the *Ministry of Grace Notes*, Lee continues to receive many invitations from churches of different denominations all around the world as he travels and freely shares God’s love and healing grace through music and testimonies to anyone who is ready to listen and receive God’s amazing grace and saving power.

Please come and be amazed by a God-given musical talent, and experience how a 61-key instrument can sound like a full orchestra under the mastership of Dr. Lee. Refreshments will be served after the concert.
